

Open hearing about Holodomor

Arranged by the Danish Parliament, the Foreign Policy Committee

Venue: Landstingsalen, December 19, 13.00 – 14.30

Holodomor refers to the Soviet-initiated famine in Ukraine in 1932 - 1933.

Holodomor is a Ukrainian term meaning "starvation-extermination". The number of Ukrainians who perished during the Holodomor is debated, with estimates varying between 2.4 and 7.5 million people.

The purpose of the hearing is to shed light on the various parts of the Holodomor, including whether it can be defined as genocide.
